Longest's Health Policymaking in the United States, Seventh Edition Michael R. Meacham, JD, MPH December 2020

This revamped version of the classic textbook originally authored by Beaufort B. Longest, Jr., links policy concepts to practical applications and real healthcare outcomes. It covers formulation, implementation, and modification of health policymaking at both the federal and state levels, while giving readers insight into real-life political results and details of on-the-ground policy decisions.

General Redesign of the Original Text

The book has been divided into four parts:

- 1) Health and Its Policymaking Context
- 2) Legislative Policymaking
- 3) Policy Implementation and Judicial Review
- 4) Charting the Future

Each part begins with a new feature: Policy Snapshot. These are examples of policymaking that can be used as case studies. The Policy Snapshot describes a real event that has had a significant impact on the aspect of health policymaking emphasized in that part of the text. The snapshots bring the concepts, theories, and analytical frameworks to life in the form of events that can be described in these terms.

In addition, the many appendixes of the text were treated differently in this edition. All the appendices were reviewed. Some were included in the actual text of the 7th edition; many were updated; some were eliminated; and a couple of new appendices were added. More importantly, however, the appendices have been divided to provide support for the concepts in that part of the book and to

facilitate their access for both students and faculty alike. The very detailed descriptions of Medicaid, Medicare, CHIP, and the ACA are at the end of section one for easy access from all parts of the book.

Finally, in the text itself, one entirely new chapter has been added. Two chapters were combined; several underwent structural change and significant re-write while others were updated and changed only as to more contemporary nomenclature and perhaps additional or slightly different nuance.
